Working Hard Together: HCDE, PEF and Apison

Hamilton County schools and the Public Education Foundation are strong partners in providing training for teachers, helping principals become more effective school leaders, improving literacy in elementary schools, and improving secondary education in Hamilton County. Apison has made great use of this partnership:

- Apison principal **Ronald Hughes** collaborates with other Hamilton County principals in regular meetings and annual leadership institutes.
- Teacher leader **Jeana Turner** has gained leadership skills through the Leadership Fellows program.
- Apison's successful reading instruction program is reinforced by new teaching methods that were proven highly effective in Hamilton County's elementary reform initiative.
- With funding from PEF, Apison educators have formed a book club to hone effective teaching practices. They will be discussing *Quality Questioning: Research-Based Practice to Engage Every Learner* and *Rigor is Not a Four-Letter Word*.

Good News! Tests will be harder!

Why is that good news? Because the state is raising its academic standards as part of the Tennessee Diploma Project (<http://tn.gov/TDP/>), beginning with tests taken in spring of 2010. Test scores are likely to dip at first, but they will rise quickly to meet the new standards, and Tennessee's students – your children – will be better prepared to compete for good jobs in our global economy.

2009 Report Card

Highlights:

- 64.8% scored **advanced** in math – up from 33% in 2003.
- 56.3% scored **advanced** in reading – up from 38% in 2003.
- Apison made 'B's on Value-added* scores in Math, Reading/Language, and Science.

**Value-added* scores measure student progress within a grade or subject. A value-added score of A indicates exceptional growth, meaning that students in this school made significantly more progress in this subject than students in the average school in the state. Reported scores are 3-year averages.

Exciting New Initiatives!

Teacher Residency - Like a medical residency program that provides "on-the-job training" for doctors, teacher residents will spend a year working with a master teacher in the classroom while also taking classes to earn a master's degree and a teaching certificate. Recruits will specialize in math, science, or other hard-to-fill subject areas.

Principal Leadership Academy – It's not easy being a principal! This year, HCDE and PEF will provide a series of workshops for 15-20 assistant principals to help prepare them to move smoothly into the responsibility of being a principal. HCDE, PEF, the Chattanooga Area Chamber of Commerce and UT Chattanooga are currently developing a full-scale Academy that will provide more intensive training, mentoring and support for assistant principals who are likely to become principals.

College Begins in Kindergarten

PEF has recently merged with the local College Access Center – a long-standing partner in our college access work. With help from the Hamilton County Department of Education and the Community Foundation of Greater Chattanooga, we have placed part-time college advisors in every high school in Hamilton County, and are working to encourage students to start thinking as early as middle school about post-high school college or technical training.

Partly as a result of this work, the number of graduates who enrolled in college from Ooltewah High, where many Apison students are zoned, increased from 70.7% in 2004 to 78.4% in 2008.
