Working Hard Together: HCDE, PEF and Lakeside

Hamilton County schools and the Public Education Foundation are strong partners in providing training for teachers, helping principals become more effective school leaders, improving literacy in elementary schools, and improving secondary education in Hamilton County. Lakeside has made great use of this partnership:

- Lakeside principal **Marsha Drake** and assistant principal **Regina Brock** have gained leadership skills through the Leadership Fellows program.
- **Ms. Drake** collaborates with other Hamilton County principals in regular meetings and annual leadership institutes.
- Lakeside's successful reading instruction program is reinforced by new teaching methods that were proven highly effective in Hamilton County's elementary reform initiative.
- With funding from PEF, for the last two years Lakeside educators have formed a book club to hone effective teaching practices.
- As part of a PEF-funded Networked Learning Community, Lakeside leaders communicate regularly with leaders from Tyner Academy, Tyner Middle Academy and Bess T. Shepherd Elementary to develop a plan for improving student success in math from kindergarten through high school.
- **Ms. Brock** has also participated in the Osborne Fellows program to earn a Master's degree in urban education.

Good News! Tests will be harder!

Why is that good news? Because the state is raising its academic standards as part of the Tennessee Diploma Project (<http://tn.gov/TDP/>), beginning with tests taken in spring of 2010. Test scores are likely to dip at first, but they will rise quickly to meet the new standards, and Tennessee's students – your children – will be better prepared to compete for good jobs in our global economy.

Elementary Reform

The Benwood Initiative is a nationally renowned, highly successful school improvement initiative that began in 2001 in Hamilton County's eight most challenged elementary schools. Lessons learned are being shared with other elementary schools, including Lakeside, through a principals' network and other types of professional development.

Exciting New Initiatives!

Teacher Residency - Like a medical residency program that provides "on-the-job training" for doctors, teacher residents will spend a year working with a master teacher in the classroom while also taking classes to earn a master's degree and a teaching certificate. Recruits will specialize in math, science, or other hard-to-fill subject areas.

Principal Leadership Academy – It's not easy being a principal! This year, HCDE and PEF will provide a series of workshops for 15-20 assistant principals to help prepare them to move smoothly into the responsibility of being a principal. HCDE, PEF, the Chattanooga Area Chamber of Commerce and UT Chattanooga are currently developing a full-scale Academy that will provide more intensive training, mentoring and support for assistant principals who are likely to become principals.

College Begins in Kindergarten

PEF has recently merged with the local College Access Center – a long-standing partner in our college access work. With help from the Hamilton County Department of Education and the Community Foundation of Greater Chattanooga, we have placed part-time college advisors in every high school in Hamilton County, and are working to encourage students to start thinking as early as middle school about post-high school college or technical training.

Partly as a result of this work, 65% of 2008 graduates from Central High, where many Lakeside students are zoned, enrolled in college the following fall. For more on school progress in Hamilton County, go to www.pefchattanooga.org/schoolinformation.
